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Thank you for your letter of 15 March to the Resident Clerk conveying the text of the President's message to the Prime Minister of the previous day.



Gorbachev had replied only the previous day to the leaders of the Six Nations/Five Continents appeal. lens e airpe your own offer clearly demonstrates that for your part /you

you have genuinely serious ideas of how to make progress on these difficult issues. And I hope that the contrast between the approach of the West and that of the East will not be lost on those who criticise our policy.

The Soviet approach to verification seems to belie
Gorbachev's fine words, when put to the test. We
must of course keep pressing them on the point, and
emphasising in public - as Geoffrey Howe did in a
speech last week - the need for them to back up
their rhetoric with practical and realistic proposals.
We also need to ensure that our own ideas for
verification across the board meet the same criteria,
while preserving Western security interests. Your
initiative on the TTBT/PNET sets a good example.
