BBC TV's "Newsround" is to transmit a special programme "Extra Election" on 27 March to launch their school mock election and have asked for an interview with you. Mr Kinnock and Dr Owen and Mr Steel (one slot) have agreed. The BBC ran a similar election in 1983 when voting resembled closely the actual election result.

The BBC hope to involve children from one school in each constituency. The "electioneering" and poll will take place at the same time as the next General Election. Head teachers will have to formally agree to elections in their schools and will be responsible for their supervision. The Hansard Society will invigilate and are to do a mail drop to all schools.
