Hans Hielscher. the London correspondence of "Der Spiegel", has asked if you would agree to an in depth interview. You last gave one to the magazine in Apirl 1985. "Der Spiegel" would ask you how you intend to further Britain's economic revival; whether other European countries could learn from the British example; the goals you have set yourself regarding the reform of the European Community; if Britain will continue to play an important role in strengthening East-West relations; and how you see the future of NATO in the light of the latest disarmament proposals. The magazine will provide you with a copy of the edited version of the interview for your final approval and last-minute changes.

"Der Spiegel" is Germany's only and Europe's largest weekly news-magazine. This would be a good opportunity for you to get your message across to continental Europe at a time when Britain's commitment to European ideals is open to misunderstanding.

Ian Yates, General Manager and Chief Executive of The Press Association, has asked if you will be principal guest and speaker at the Members' Annual Luncheon at the Savoy Hotel on Wednesday 8 June 1988. You last spoke at this event in 1980.

"Press Association" is a news co-operative owned by the daily and Sunday press of the UK and Irish Republic. About 200 members attend the luncheon. It will include owners and senior management and editorial representatives of the national newspapers, home and international news agencies including Reuters and Associated Press of the United States, the BBC and independent television and radio.

The magazine will publish the results in November (they have a three month lead time). Jan Goodwin, who is British born, would like an interview with you to run alongside the poll. She will be in Britain from 27 to 31 July.

The magazine has a readership of 20 million and most of the 250 newspapers taking part in the poll will no doubt carry the article giving you a global readership.

Ina Ginsberg, Washington Editor of Interview Magazine, has asked for an interview with you. The magazine is a monthly published by Andy Warhol Foundation. It has a 200,000 circulation and is available in all major American cities and London, Paris, Munich, Amsterdam and Hong Kong.

Recommendation

I understand that Crawfie spoke to you about this and you agreed to an interview. You have recently given the American correspondents in London an extensive briefing, will be doing a number of interviews when you are in Washington on Friday 17 July, and have agreed to give CNN an interview in September. Also the request above from Ladies Home Journal would give a much wider readership.
