GCE A LEVELS: HIGGINSON COMMITTEE REPORT

In the light of our helpful discussion on 19 May, I am circulating a draft Parliamentary statement to accompany publication of the report.

It makes clear that the Government has decided not to pursue the key recommendation for a five subject A level programme with streamlined A level syllabuses, and it does not of course commit us to take forward any of the detailed recommendations. As agreed at E(EP), the statement promotes the existing Government policy of broadening by use of AS levels. There is increasing interest in schools in these new examinations, and I am continuing to promote and publicise them widely.

Peter Walker and I propose to publish the Higginson report on Tuesday 7 June. I should be grateful for clearance by Monday 6 June.

I am copying this minute to members of E(EP), to Tom King and to Sir Robin Butler.

DRAFT PARLIAMENTARY ANSWER TO COINCIDE WITH PUBLICATION OF THE HIGGINSON REPORT

My rt hon Friend, the Secretary for Wales, and I are publishing today the report of the Committee chaired by Dr Higginson on GCE Advanced Levels. We are grateful to Dr Higginson and his colleagues for the considerable time and energies that they have devoted to its preparation.

We endorse the Committee's recommendations for general principles which should govern A levels, which take forward the policies that we have been pursuing on the curriculum and examinations in order to raise levels of attainment.

We therefore welcome and endorse the Committee's recommendations that A levels should be demanding, single-subject, examinations for able candidates of all kinds and from all backgrounds, and that they should develop students' understanding and powers of reasoning as well as covering a significant area of knowledge. We support the recognition of the need for rigorous assessment arrangements.

The report also indicates widespread support for increased breadth of study for 16-18 year olds undertaking A level courses in full-time education. It recommends that such students should, if possible, study five subjects, some at A level and some at GCE Advanced Supplementary (AS) level. To allow for study of more subjects, A level syllabuses should be streamlined, and students should devote more of their timetables to examination studies.

The Government endorses the general aim of broadening A level students' programmes of study. We see AS levels as the key to achieving greater breadth and hence welcome the Committee's backing for a continuing vital role for these new examinations, both in securing breadth of study and in supplementing main areas of study. Following the introduction of AS levels last year, A level students, by choosing a mix of A and AS level syllabuses, are already able to put

together broader and more balanced programmes of study. We therefore encourage all schools and colleges to offer their A level students some choice of AS levels this autumn, and greater choice in future

The Committee's detailed proposals for implementation of its recommendations give a central role to the School Examinations and Assessment Council, whose establishment in shadow form was recently announced. In view of the substantial tasks facing that Council as early priorities in particular, the introduction of assessment and testing arrangements for the national curriculum and the establishment, monitoring and review of GCSE - the Government does not consider it appropriate at present to ask the Council to embark on the review and streamlining of all A level syllabuses as recommended by the Committee. Increased provision of AS levels by schools and colleges, and full recognition of their value and importance in the admission arrangements of institutions of higher education, will encourage broader studies amongst A level students. The Government will continue to monitor closely the introduction and take-up of AS levels and will consider, in the light of progress, whether further steps are needed to secure the necessary broadening of post-16 education.

A2C67/6 PRIME MINISTER PARLIAMENTARY ANSWER ON PUBLICATION OF THE HIGGINSON REPORT You saw over the weekend the DES proposed Answers to arranged PQs on both Assessment and Testing and the Higginson Report on 'A' levels. DES have accepted in full your comments on the Assessment and Testing Answer, which will now be given tomorrow. On Higginson, you called for substantial redrafting and asked to see a revised version. During the day, Brian and I have had several discussions with DES about this. I now attach a revised draft they have sent over (together with the original draft for comparison). Brian has two further comments on the redraft: Delete the first sentence of paragraph 2, and simply start that paragraph saying "The Government welcomes the Committee's endorsement of 'A' levels as demanding ..." (ii Delete the second sentence of paragraph 4, on the grounds that this both breaks the flow and makes an unnecessary reference to the SEAC. I have discussed these points with Mr. Baker's office, and he is reluctant to accept them in full. He has, however, suggested two amendments, which I have marked in red on the revised draft. The DES argument is that: The opening to paragraph 2 refers to the general (i) principles in chapter 2 of the Higginson Report, and not to the detailed implementation in chapter 3. (ii) In paragraph 4 Mr. Baker is keen to be able to make some reference to the priority tasks of the SEAC when he makes this announcement.
